I was also a bit nervous about comparison with work from other groups and countries, but I found that both interesting and confidence boosting. I found my work compared quite well with that of others, so if you are holding back, don't. There is still time to get involved. We've all had the

details, but if you can't find them, I'm sure won't mind passing them on again.

Before all this began, I had started cutting a series of lino blocks based on the symbols from the Chinese Zodiac. I had only finished cutting and test printing a couple, but fortunately Pete had cut the rest of the blocks to size for me so I have been able to finish them. Fortuitously they of a size that can be used for the 20:20, so I am using one of those. It also gives me the chance to use up the water soluble printing ink which has been lurking at the back of the cupboard for years. Mostly, however, I have doing embroidery and other textile stuff, as that can be done sitting in the garden, but I have sort of combined the two as I have a number prints made on fabric into which I have begun stitching.

Quite what I'm going to do with them when I have finished, I don't yet know. We shall see.

It's a very peculiar situation in which we find ourselves, so I hope everyone is keeping well and tolerably happy.

I hope that when I do the next Newsletter at the end of the year, (on time maybe,) the situation will be a little clearer and we can start to plan for Group activities again.
